It has been a busy half term at Beech Green with lots of interesting things going on in school. We are saying goodbye to Mrs Campbell on Friday. She is taking up a role as a health and wellbeing coach, which is a passion of hers. We would like to thank her for all of her work at Beech Green and wish her every happiness. Some parents have asked about our progress towards OFSTED improvement so I thought that I would share some of the things that we have been working together on (among others):

- We have had a maths focus and a re-visit from Steve Lomax (advisor) who was really pleased with our progress
- New behaviour policy in place an external advisor commented on as to how it had had a positive impact in the corridors and classes
- New reward system of marbles in a jar (class rewards) and house points
- We have kept the Beech Green values but added clear rules of 'Ready, Respectful and Safe'
- Timetabling in classes has changed to get the optimum learning time
- We are working to improve attendance Mrs Collins is leading this
- Staff have undertaken more safeguarding training
- We have purchased a new French scheme of work
- We are working closely with the community social worker and early help coordinator
- We have had a visit from an LA school advisor

The staff have worked so hard to make Beech Green the best it can be. They are a super team of people.

Look who's Talking Competition

Freddie (Yr1,) Ettie (yr4,) and Julia (Yr5) recently took part in the final of a oracy competition for Gloucestershire's Infant, Junior and Primary schools called "Look who's Talking!"

The aim of the competition was to develop children's oracy skills across the curriculum. Oracy is both learning *to* talk and learning *through* talk. Each child delivered a two-minute talk on their chosen subject in front of a large audience of parents and fellow competitors. We are so proud of all of them. They spoke clearly, confidently and fluently. Well done to all three!

Julia said, "I went to Dinglewell School. I enjoyed talking to everyone there. This experience will help me in the future when I do presentations in secondary school."





First aid talk

Years 5 and 6 have been learning about the human body in their science lessons this term. To strengthen their knowledge in this topic, they were lucky enough to enjoy a visit from Mrs Wilkinson, a parent and paramedic.

She spoke to them about the workings of the circulatory system and how to keep themselves healthy. The teachers were wired up to an electrocardiogram, (ECG) machine, before the children took it in turns to use stethoscopes to listen to each others heartbeats.

It's lovely to have parents visit to enhance our curriculum.

Year 4 Residential






World Book Day

Welcome to the Book Corner






Thank you by Jarvis

Having upset most of his family and classmates, 10-year-old bully and narrator of the story, Hector, fixes his hatred on a local homeless man, who he assumes is responsible for a series of thefts from London landmarks. When Hector discovers he is mistaken, he sets out to track down the true thief, finding help and learning life lessons along the way from the homeless community he previously held in such disdain, as well as from his arch-enemy, the class swot Mei-Li. Deftly tackling bullying, homelessness and the redemptive power of kindness all in one swoop, this story also delivers enough intrigue to interest older readers, whilst the clear language makes it accessible to all.
